## **Course Objectives**

#### **Understanding of institutional issues:**

- Rationale for transforming an NGO into a licensed MFI
- Benefits and risks involved
- Key decisions that must be made (ownership, capitalization, legal form, governance, products)
- Challenges and difficulties of implementation, including effects of transformation on the institution

# Understanding of key regulatory and policy issues

- Benefits and costs of regulation and supervision
- Tiered structures
- Uncertainties regarding implementation of legislation

# **Course Summary**

This course uses case studies to investigate the benefits, risks and challenges of commercializing and licensing microfinance operations from the viewpoints of both the microfinance institutions and the regulators. It brings the lessons of actual experiences to bear on the issues facing managers of NGOs undergoing transformation; their investors, funders and international networks; and the policymakers and central bankers responsible for legislation, regulation and supervision. The course focuses on the lessons learned from experiences such as K-Rep Bank (Kenya), Mibanco (Peru), Sinapi Aba Trust (Ghana), Tajikistan, Bank Constanta (Georgia), and others. Particular attention is paid to the creative tension between financial goals and poverty



focus, and the implications for human resource management. The importance of a suitable legal and regulatory framework is discussed, focusing on special legislation for MFIs and the implications of requiring that MFIs transform to licensed status. Other topics include mobilization of investment capital, ownership, capitalization, governance, costs of regulatory compliance, alternative delivery channels, and product development in the context of transformation.

## **Methodology**

The course is team taught in such a way as to encourage discussion around the issues. Presentations of lessons learned from case studies are supplemented by the various experiences of the participants. Participants will also learn experientially through break-out group discussions on benefits and risks of transformation; the critical decisions facing an NGO Board in the midst of a difficult transformation; and the pros and cons of draft legislation for licensing Microfinance Deposit-taking Institutions.

#### **Course Content**

## Module I: Background

Introduction to the meaning and rationale of transformation. Historical perspective on the emergence of transformation in the 1990s as an important strategy for NGO-MFIs to improve sustainability, outreach and independence. Mibanco (Peru) case as a typical early example of the process. Discussion of the key benefits and risks of transformation.

## **Module II: Issues and Challenges of Transformation;**

Discussion of key issues and challenges of transformation based on the experience of K-Rep and other MFIs that have gone through the process, including: the decision to transform; objectives; institutional format; organizational structure; ownership and governance; finding investors and structuring the deal; human resources; data management systems and migration; and operations. A participatory case study based on an actual NGO transformation involves participants in confronting the challenges concerning staff, clients, management and governance faced by a transforming institution in mid-stream.

# Module III: Reforming the Legal and Regulatory Framework

A growing number of countries are enacting legislation or special regulations to permit specialized microfinance institutions to become licensed to take savings and mobilize investment, often providing different options or "tiers" in terms of ownership and taking savings deposits. Does licensing and supervision of MFIs help or hinder development of the market? What are the risks and costs involved, both to regulators and to MFIs? Key issues and lessons of experience are drawn from COMESA, Kenya, Ghana, Ethiopia, Tajikistan and other countries for legislators and regulators contemplating extending licensing and regulatory requirements to include a range of



MFIs. Participants in break-out groups will debate the merits of a typical proposed legislation and accompanying regulations from different viewpoints to discover that there is no easy answer.

#### **Module IV: Case Studies**

Experiences of K-Rep, Kenya Women Finance Trust and FAULU in Kenya, Sinapi Aba Trust and Opportunity International in Ghana, Mibanco in Peru, and others serve as a basis for discussion of the issues and challenges involved in transforming from an unregulated to a licensed institution, or from a credit-only NGO to a deposit-taking MFI or commercial bank, and the Implications for outreach and sustainability. Experiences with new legislation in Tajikistan and Georgia are used to illustrate both positive and negative potential consequences of introducing new legislation.

#### **Audience**

The course is designed for a diverse audience to facilitate the exchange of viewpoints among practitioners, regulators, funders and policymakers with respect to the issues surrounding the transformation and regulation of MFIs.

## **Prerequisites**

The course is designed to accommodate and draw on the experiences of participants from diverse backgrounds, including MFI practitioners, central bankers, donor agencies, international networks and investors, and policymakers. It has no formal pre-requisites, other than fluency in English and participation in the first two weeks of the Boulder MFT program. Nevertheless, those participants directly involved in the transformation process may wish to take the course on Transforming Microfinance Institutions for an introductory overview of the process and experiences.
