OUR PURPOSE

Because North Florida Baptist College is a ministry of the local church, the purpose of this college is the same as set forth by the Immanuel Baptist Church. This purpose is found in Ephesians 4:11-13, *And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ: Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ:* In order to accomplish this goal, we are to contend for the faith as stated in Jude verse 3, *Beloved, when I gave all diligence to write unto you of the common salvation, it was needful for me to write unto you, and exhort you that ye should earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints.* We are providing the finest in academic curricula as well as varied opportunities of Christian service through the ministries of the Immanuel Baptist Church.

Our faculty and staff set the pace and example in Christian service. Every student is trained to carry out the Great Commission through the local church. GENERAL INFORMATION

WHY ATTEND NORTH FLORIDA BAPTIST COLLEGE?

A young person can choose from a number of Bible colleges. What makes North Florida Baptist College different from all of the others? We believe that North Florida Baptist College is different for the following three distinct reasons:

Balanced Philosophy: The education and development of our churches' young people are important and sacred endeavors. The philosophy of North Florida Baptist College can be summarized in one word—balance! We believe that those who enter full-time Christian service should have elements of strength and beauty. College days should be full of hard work and fun. Students should study the ministry at the same time they are experiencing it. College is that time of life in which young people strive to educate themselves for the future while they are experiencing the enjoyment of college life today. Graduates from North Florida Baptist College should have an understanding of how to build a church and how to dress when they go to church. They should be taught the importance of preaching and the importance of clean restrooms and nurseries. Our young people should be taught the importance of organizing a group yet realizing the responsibility of caring for an individual. In short, our young people need to be taught balance. This has been the key to the strength and growth of Immanuel Baptist Church and is an element of strength that is a part of North Florida Baptist College.

Personal Touch: One of the most important elements of Immanuel Baptist Church is that it is not just a church; it is a family. The services of Immanuel Baptist Church resemble a family reunion as much as they do a church service. It is with

North Florida Baptist College is located in the Jacksonville, Florida area. In preparing our students for full-time Christian service, we have several outstanding programs of study that are designed to give each student a multi-dimensional education. In addition to our Elementary and Secondary Education programs, we also offer a Bachelor of Science in Office Administration. All of our programs of study are designed to teach balanced, personal service for Christ.

Why attend North Florida Baptist College? It is a unique place because of its balance, its personal touch, and its desire to teach the importance of being a servant. We hope that everyone will choose to be part of North Florida Baptist College.

CAMPUS ENVIRONMENT

We are excited about developing and expanding the campus of North Florida Baptist College. We want our students not only to be proud of their campus but also to enjoy their campus. After all, it is their home away from home.

North Florida Baptist College's closed campus policy provides a wholesome and safe atmosphere where only students and approved visitors are allowed.

We want to provide our students with a balanced campus life. Regular activities and an outstanding campus provide a combination that will ensure an enjoyable college experience.

- Soulwinning—There are several opportunities for personal soulwinning each week.
- Private devotions—Each student is to maintain his own personal devotional life with the Lord through daily Bible reading and prayer.
- Chapel—Chapel attendance is required. To challenge the hearts of the students, a variety of speakers preach from the North Florida Baptist College platform.
- Classes—North Florida Baptist College conducts all classes in an atmosphere that promotes spiritual growth and maturity along with academic knowledge.
- Music groups—These groups provide a unique service to the college. The choir, ensembles, quartets, and other groups give students an opportunity to participate in various levels of music. These groups give the students valuable experience in the field of music providing them with an opportunity to be a blessing to others.
- Christian service—Areas of church service are required each week for each student. This service is done under the supervision of the Administration.

DORMITORIES

North Florida Baptist College requires that all single men and women live in the dormitories. There is a \$2,000.00 charge per semester for room and board. The registration fee must be paid in full before a room is reserved for a student. This is necessary to plan accurately for the incoming student body and to make adequate preparation for living quarters.

Each student is expected to furnish his own linens, pillows, and blankets for a single bed and should be prepared to share expenses for an ironing board, broom, and trash cans. Access to washers and dryers is provided in each dormitory. Appliances, such as DVD players, televisions, hot plates, and electric skillets are not permitted. Lamps, fans, sewing machines, hair dryers, irons, and electric razors may be used in the dormitories. No voice-activated electronics, such as Alexa, Facebook Portal, Echo, or other such home devices are allowed. Desktop computers are not permitted; however, students are encouraged to bring a laptop computer with wireless capabilities to assist them in completing class requirements.

AREA EMPLOYMENT

Because North Florida Baptist College is close to the Jacksonville job market, both men and women may find employment in well-paying jobs rather easily. Our staff will work extensively with students to find employment to meet their needs.

OFF-CAMPUS HOUSING

All single students age twenty-five or older who wish to live off campus, except those living with their parents, must request permission from the Administration. This request should be submitted in writing thirty days before the student registers. It

should be sent to the attention of the Administration. The letter of request must include information concerning with whom the student would like to live and the person's relationship to the student.

AUTOMOBILES

Each student who owns, maintains, or operates an automobile on or around the campus must register the automobile with the Registrar's Office within seventy-two hours of arrival on campus. Each automobile must display a registration decal. Each student must have and maintain insurance on his registered vehicle. Proof of insurance is required when the vehicle is registered with the Registrar's Office.

It is not the policy of North Florida Baptist College to allow students to drive each other's vehicles. No faculty, staff, or administrative personnel is to advise a student to loan his vehicle to another student. Any student who permits another student to operate his vehicle should obtain the permission of his or her parents and verify that any driver is properly insured.

The school reserves the right to restrict the use of an automobile by any student if the use of the automobile is thought to be detrimental to the academic achievement of the student or if the student has abused the privilege of operating an automobile. A \$25.00 fee is required each semester for each vehicle registered.

HEALTH SERVICES

There are a number of specialists and doctors located in the Jacksonville area. Many hospitals and major medical centers, including Mayo Clinic, are also located in the Jacksonville area.

HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE

All students are required to have hospitalization and surgical insurance. Before registration can be completed, proof of insurance coverage must be provided. It is recommended that parents check with their insurance provider to verify the student's coverage in Florida.

If a student does not have current health insurance or the current insurance provider will not provide coverage in the state of Florida, the student may apply for health insurance through an online company or other Florida-based provider.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

All tuition, room and board, and other fees due are payable upon registration each semester, or monthly installment payments may be made.

EXPLANATION OF FEES

Application Fee: A non-refundable fee of \$25.00 must accompany each application for admission. This fee can be paid online or by check.

Registration Fee: A registration fee is due and payable each semester a student registers for classes. If the student pays by the dates listed below, the registration for new students is as follows:

Fall registration by May 31-\$50.00; June 1-30-\$100.00; July 1-31-\$150.00; August 1 through Opening Day-\$200.00; Registration Day-\$250.00; Late Registration-\$300.00.

Late Registration Fee: The registration fee is \$300.00 for students registering after the scheduled registration date.

Tuition Fee: The fee of \$2,300.00 for tuition per semester allows the student to register for twelve to seventeen semester hours without an additional charge. Students registering for fewer than twelve or more than seventeen will be charged at the rate of \$195.00 per credit hour.

Room and Board: The charge of \$2,000.00 per semester for room and board includes all the student's meals provided during the semester.

Graduation Fee: Each graduating senior will be charged \$150.00 to cover the cost of his regalia and diploma. Announcements must be purchased through North Florida Baptist College for an additional cost.

Late Payment Fee: A late fee of \$15.00 will be assessed if payment is not made by the due date.

Laundry: The washer and dryer units operate on a prepaid card system. The students will be able to pay the Finance Office for the desired amount they wish to have placed on their laundry card.

Dormitory Key Deposit: A fee of \$10.00 per key is charged to dormitory students. This is refundable when the keys are returned to the proper supervisor.

Post Office Box Key Deposit: A fee of \$10.00 is charged to all students for their campus post office box keys. All students are required to register for a campus post office box. This is refundable when the keys are returned to the proper supervisor.

Private Music Lessons: A \$100.00 fee per semester is charged regardless of the number of lessons given.

Automobile Registration Fee: A fee of \$25.00 per semester is charged.

Printing Fee: The printing fee is \$2.00 per print job or a maximum of \$20.00 per semester.

Computer Lab Fee: A fee of \$65.00 per semester is charged. This fee gives the student access to the computer lab of North Florida Baptist College and the ability to print papers on the black and white printer located in the lab.

Computer Course Fee: For each student enrolling in the Church Communications degree, there will be a \$75.00 fee per semester to ensure that the student has the software needed to participate in the required classes. Only the software is provided. It is the student's responsibility either to utilize the North Florida Baptist College computers in the Computer Lab or to purchase his own computer. If a student purchases his own computer, the computer must be able to perform the required functions that his courses will demand.

Returned Check Fee: If a student writes a bad check to the church or college, he will be charged a fee. This fee will be \$20.00 for the first occurrence and \$25.00 for the second. After the second returned check, the student will be required to pay with a certified check or money order for the remainder of the current school year. If a student writes a bad check, he will have three business days to bring the cash, certified check, or money order to the Finance Office to make reconciliation for the check and check fee.

Notice of Nondiscriminatory Policy Regarding Students: North Florida Baptist College admits students of any race,

color, nationality, or ethnic origin to all rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally afforded or made available to students at the school. It does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, nationality, or ethnic origin in administration of its educational policies, admissions policies, scholarships, athletic programs, and other school-administered programs. It only accepts students from independent, fundamental Baptist churches who are in good standing with their home church.

Financial Terms: The tuition and room and board total is divided into four payments when a semester has four months or five when there are five months. The first tuition and room and board payment is due at registration. (This includes fees that apply to every student but does not include fees to those enrolling in classes that may have additional fees.) The remaining payments will be due the first business day of each ensuing month.

We have no wish to be unkind or unduly harsh, but it is imperative that all accounts be paid on time. The college receives no government funds or assistance from the state or denominational sources. Consequently, we depend on our regular income to meet the salaries of the faculty and staff and the operating expenses. We caution students to be prompt in making their payments so as not to jeopardize their privilege of attending North Florida Baptist College. If a student's account should become six weeks in arrears, it will result in the student's immediate dismissal from college.

Break/Holiday Fees: Due to the fact that North Florida Baptist College is on an alternative schedule, there will be breaks every eight weeks. There are no added fees for the students to stay during the mid-semester breaks in October and March. There will be daily rates of \$10.00 per day for those students who stay in the dormitories during the Christmas or summer breaks.

Books: The cost of books and supplies varies depending on the course of study, number of hours, etc. This cost is in addition to expenses paid to the college.

Changing a Course: A student may drop a class during the first two weeks of a semester. After two weeks of the current semester, no classes may be dropped. The student is expected to complete the class. There will be no fee for changing a class, but a student will not be able to drop the class after the specified time.

Withdrawal: Any student who is expelled or withdraws from North Florida Baptist College regardless of the reason will owe the remaining amount of tuition, room and board, and fees due on or before the date the student withdrew or was expelled. For example, if a student withdraws between the September payment and the October payment, the student will be responsible for the October payment.

Should a student leave the college for any reason after having paid more than the amounts outlined above, he will receive a refund for any overpayment. No refunds will be made to a student for any other reason. All requests for refunds must be submitted in writing to the Finance Office.

A refund of the unused portion of tuition, fees, and other charges will be made to veterans or eligible persons who fail to enter or fail to complete the course as required by Veterans Administration regulations. The refund will be within ten

percent of an exact pro rata refund. No more than \$100.00 of the established registration fee will be retained if a veteran or eligible person fails to enter the course. Extenuating circumstances will be reviewed by the Administration on a case-by-case basis.

Federal Grants: Students attending North Florida Baptist College are ineligible to receive loans or grants which must be approved through federally sponsored programs, such as the Guaranteed Student Loan Program or the Basic Education Opportunity Grant Program.

AUDITING COURSES

Students who wish to benefit from certain classes without taking them for credit may register for such courses on an audit basis. Auditing a course costs \$95.00 per semester hour.

SCHOLARSHIPS

North Florida Baptist College offers several scholarships. Students applying for these scholarships must submit an application for approval to the Registrar's Office by Registration Day at the beginning of each semester.

Academic Scholarship: Any valedictorian or salutatorian from a Christian school with at least five students in the graduating class may apply for this scholarship. If this scholarship is awarded, the student will receive one semester's tuition free. This scholarship may not be combined with any other scholarship and is valid only for undergraduate students and only for the student's first semester at North Florida Baptist College.

Family Scholarship: If a husband is paying as a full-time student, his wife may take one course (up to 5 credits) at no

charge. She would be subject to all of the college rules and the demerit system. If a husband is paying as a full-time student, his wife may take additional courses at half of the regular cost. If she is taking nine or more credits, she will pay 50% of the regular semester's tuition. If she is taking fewer than nine credits, the fee charged will be for any credits in addition to the tuition-free course. If she is taking two or more classes and the total number of credits she is taking is less than nine, the class with the greatest number of credits will be the one that is tuition-free.

Christian Service Scholarship: This \$500.00 scholarship may be awarded to those whose parents are in full-time Christian service and are paid employees of their church. This scholarship will be awarded only for the first semester at North Florida Baptist College.

MK Scholarship: Students whose parents are presently missionaries outside the United States may apply for this scholarship. Those students eligible for this scholarship will receive a 50% reduction in tuition for the ladies and a 25% reduction for the men. If the student also qualifies for the Academic Scholarship, that scholarship will be applied the first semester and the MK Scholarship for all remaining semesters.

PK Scholarship: Pastor's children are eligible for this scholarship. The young ladies will receive a 50% reduction in tuition and the young men a 25% reduction. If the student also qualifies for the Academic Scholarship, that will be awarded for the first semester and the PK Scholarship will be awarded for the remaining semesters. Only children of the senior pastor of a church qualify for this scholarship.

Florida/Georgia Scholarship: Students who live in Florida or Georgia may apply for this scholarship. Those students eligible for this scholarship will receive a \$500.00 reduction in tuition

for the first four semesters. If the student also qualifies for the Academic Scholarship, that scholarship will be applied the first semester and the FL/GA Scholarship for three remaining semesters.

Musician's Scholarship: Students who have served in the music ministry of their local church and are entering into the Music Education Program may apply for this scholarship. Those students eligible for this scholarship will receive a \$500.00 reduction in tuition for eight semesters. If the student also qualifies for the Academic Scholarship, that scholarship will be applied the first semester and the Musician's Scholarship for the following seven semesters.

VETERANS INFORMATION

Veteran Academic Information: North Florida Baptist College is on a 4.0 grading system. Any veteran not maintaining at least a 2.0 cumulative grade point average will be put on academic probation. A veteran student who fails to attain a cumulative "C" average after one term on academic probation will have VA education benefits terminated at the end of that term. He may once again be certified for benefits after he has regained a cumulative "C" average.

Veteran Attendance and Absences Policy: The maximum number of absences permitted for any reason during any one semester is nine hours for a three-hour course or six hours for a two-hour course. Absences beyond the maximum allowed will result in the student's veteran benefits being terminated.

Veteran Refund Policy: The refund of the unused portion of tuition, fees, and other charges for veterans or eligible persons who fail to enter a course, withdraw, or discontinue prior to completion will be made for all amounts paid which exceed the approximate pro rata portion of the total charges that the

length of the completed portion of the course bears to the total length of the course. The proration will be determined on the ratio of the number of days or hours of instruction completed by the student to the total number of instructional days or hours in the course.

Veteran Previous Training: Veteran students must report all previous education and training. The school will evaluate the transcripts and grant appropriate credit with training time and tuition reduced proportionately and with the VA and student so notified.

Notice to Students, Staff, and Faculty Members: In the event of a catastrophe, such as, but not limited to, fire, windstorm, hail, hurricane, explosion, riot, civil commotion, mold, smoke, or any other natural disaster or unforeseen disaster caused by aircraft, vehicles, etc., North Florida Baptist College is not liable for damage to any personal belongings or the wellbeing of students, staff, or faculty members.

North Florida Baptist College reserves the right to withdraw courses at any time, to change the fees, to change the calendar, or to change the rules regarding admission as well as graduation requirements or any other regulation affecting the student body. Changes shall become effective whenever the Administration so determines and shall apply not only to prospective students but also to those who are matriculated in the college at that time.

2. Complete all forms in the application packet or online.
3. All incoming freshmen are required to submit ACT scores to the Admissions Office for final acceptance. The ACT is not required of students who have earned sixty-four semester hours from another recognized college or university. For those students who have not had the opportunity to schedule taking the ACT on a national test date, arrangements can be made for testing at North Florida Baptist College prior to enrollment.

APPLICANTS MUST MEET THE FOLLOWING REQUIREMENTS:

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS:

1. Married men must be at least twenty years old by the first day of registration for each semester.
2. Married women must be at least nineteen years old by the first day of registration for each semester.
3. It is the general policy of North Florida Baptist College not to accept students who have been divorced and are currently single.
4. On the first day of registration, each student must have either a high school diploma or a G.E.D.

5. Before a student's admission is finalized, the Admissions Office must receive a Pastor's Reference form and two Personal Reference forms.

Written Personal Testimony: Since North Florida Baptist College is distinctively a Christian school to train Christians to serve our Lord Jesus Christ, applicants must give testimony of having received Him as personal Saviour. A written personal testimony of the applicant's assurance of salvation is required with the application.

Character References: The Administration and faculty have a deep conviction that we endeavor to provide not only the best academic and practical training but also the best spiritual training. Building Christian character and spirituality is a prime goal of our college. Each applicant must give as references the names and addresses of three acquaintances (his pastor and two others not related to the applicant) to give testimony regarding his salvation and Christian character. The Admissions Office must receive all three references, including the pastor's reference.

Each student is required to abide by the standards of Christian conduct as set forth in the student handbook which is received at orientation each semester. These standards are based on the Word of God. We believe that every Christian ought to do what those called to Christian service must do. (I Corinthians 4:1; I Timothy 3:1-7)

North Florida Baptist College believes that the task of a Christian is soulwinning and building God's work. A prospective student must have a testimony of adherence to this policy in order to be considered for admission to North Florida Baptist College. Any student may be denied admission if he or she has been guilty of violating this principle.

Transcripts from Other Colleges: Any applicant from another college must have transcripts sent directly to North Florida Baptist College from every college he has attended even if no credits were earned and whether or not he desires to transfer credits. It is expected that transfer students be in good standing at any schools attended and that all financial balances are paid in full. Credit may be given for all subjects which are equivalent to those offered in our catalog and in which a grade of "C" or better was earned. An evaluation of a transcript must be done by the Administration to determine which credits can be accepted and to determine the classification of the transfer student. A student must earn at least sixty-four credit hours at North Florida Baptist College to receive a four-year degree or at least thirty-two credit hours for a two-year degree. Credits will not be transferred from more than two institutions without Administrative approval. North Florida Baptist College will review credits from any number of schools that were attended while the student served in the military. It is the responsibility of the student who requests transferring of credits from another college to make available to the Administration the catalog of that college. A maximum of sixty-four credits will be transferred from other colleges.

TRANSFER CREDITS

North Florida Baptist College will accept credits from other colleges of like faith and practice. All transferred credits are subject to Administrative approval. The maximum number of credits that may be transferred to North Florida Baptist College is sixty-four credits for a four-year degree and thirty-two credits for a two-year degree. The Administration maintains the right to deny acceptance of any credits it deems unsatisfactory or inadequate toward the completion of a degree. Only credits that are equivalent to those subjects offered at North Florida Baptist College will be given for all subjects in which a grade of "C" or better was earned.

Students wanting to take courses at other colleges during the summers between regular semesters while enrolled at North Florida Baptist College must receive written permission in advance to have these credits transferred. This approval will come from the Administration and must include approval of the school and specific courses to be transferred. This will also be subject to the rules of transferring credits.

Transcript Request: Students wanting a copy of their North Florida Baptist College transcripts must contact the Registrar's Office or electronically submit the Transcript Request form provided on the website (www.NFBC4ME.com). Students must fulfill their entire financial obligation with the college before records will be released. Students are expected to submit Transcript Request at least two weeks in advance of needing them. Two copies of the student's transcript are issued upon graduation. Any additional copies will be sent at the student's request for a fee of \$10.00 per transcript to be paid in advance.

CHURCH ATTENDANCE

All requests to attend any church other than the Immanuel Baptist Church must be individually approved by the college Administration. Because we are a local New Testament church and this is where students will be training to serve, it is requested that students of North Florida Baptist College join Immanuel Baptist Church so that they might actively participate in all of our local church ministries. The membership of each student from outside the Immanuel Baptist Church is at the discretion of the student's home pastor. We respect his decision. There are many benefits to students being members of Immanuel Baptist Church during their training years here. They will be able to sing in the choir, teach classes, and serve in many other areas which the policies and procedures of our church require.

PLACEMENT TESTS

North Florida Baptist College offers placement tests for English, math, music, and computer. All new students and any transfer student who has not earned credits for English Grammar I, College Math Survey, Fundamentals of Music, or Computer Basics will be given the opportunity to take these tests only at the beginning of his first semester at North Florida Baptist College.

English Placement Test: A student whose score is not at least 75% on the English placement test will need to take Basic English. A student whose score is between 75%-92% will be enrolled in English Grammar I. A student whose score is 93% or higher will be enrolled in English Grammar II.

Math Placement Test: Students who enroll in certain majors must either pass the math placement test or take College Math Survey. A student whose score is an 85% or higher has the option to accept the test grade and pay for the College Math Survey credits or take the class for a higher grade.

Music Placement Test: Students who enroll in certain majors must either pass the music placement test or take Fundamentals of Music. A student whose score is an 85% or higher has the option to accept the test grade and pay for the Fundamentals of Music credits or take the class for a higher grade.

Computer Placement Test: A student whose score is an 85% or higher has the option to accept the test grade and pay for the Computer Basics credits or take the class for a higher grade.

Keyboarding Placement Test: A student enrolled in Office Administration may be eligible to test out of Keyboarding I at the discretion of the Administration.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

North Florida Baptist College offers a Bachelor of Science degree in the following majors:

Pastoral Theology: This course of study is designed for men desiring to prepare for the pastorate.

Assistant Pastoral: This course of study is designed for men desiring to prepare for full-time Christian service.

Missions: This course of study is designed to prepare men and ladies to be future missionaries. All students preparing for service in foreign missions must meet with the Missions Coordinator for personalized preparation.

Christian Ministries: This course of study is designed for men and ladies who are undecided about their futures.

Elementary Education: This course of study is designed to train qualified teachers for the elementary grades of the Christian school in the local church.

Secondary Education: This course of study is designed to train qualified teachers for the junior high and high school grades of the Christian school in the local church.

Music Education: This course of study is designed to train young people to work in the independent, fundamental Baptist church music program. In order to enter the Music Education degree, a student must pass a proficiency test. This test includes being able to play any song in the *John W. Schaum Book C*, all major scales in two octaves, and any hymn in the following keys: C, F, G, D, and B^b.

Office Administration: This course of study is designed to train ladies to work in the church or Christian school office.

Church Communications: This course of study is designed to prepare students in the areas of graphic design, web design, sound systems, audio/visual, photography, and social media platforms.

Two-Year Associate degree: Students may receive an associate degree in four fields of study: Assistant Pastoral Studies, Christian Ministries, Office Administration, and Church Communications. A minimum of sixty-four credits must be earned according to the course requirements.

GRADING SYSTEM

North Florida Baptist College uses the 4.0 system for grading.

A - 4 honor points per semester hour

B - 3 honor points per semester hour

C - 2 honor points per semester hour

D - 1 honor point per semester hour

F - 0 honor points per semester hour

W - Withdrawal

No "D" hours are allowed in a student's field of study. All majors must make at least a "C" in all Bible and English courses. All education majors must make at least a "C" in all education and proficiency courses.

At the close of each semester, every student whose bill is up-to-date will receive a copy of his grades for that semester. A student with a delinquent account will receive a copy of his grades once his overdue bill has been paid.

UNITS OF CREDIT: The unit of credit is the semester hour. A semester hour is one fifty-minute period of instruction per week for sixteen to eighteen weeks. No student may carry more than seventeen semester hours without special permission.

Due to the load and requirements, a student enrolled in Student Teaching and Professional Development may not take any additional classes.

GRADUATION

In order to march in the commencement exercises, a student must complete all of the academic requirements for his degree in addition to having a current school bill with no outstanding balance.

A candidate for graduation for the Bachelor of Science degree must take a minimum of sixty-four semester hours at North Florida Baptist College and must meet the normal requirements for a major field of study.

A student who expects to march in any graduation ceremony must be certain that the Administration is aware of his plans to march at the beginning of the semester prior to the graduation ceremony.

A student who maintains a high academic average and is receiving a degree at North Florida Baptist College will graduate with honors as follows:

Cum Laudean academic average of at least 3.25
Magna Cum Laudean academic average of at least 3.50
Summa Cum Laudean academic average of at least 3.75

At least 128 hours must be earned for the Bachelor of Science degree. Also, a student must have an academic average of at least a "C" (2.00) in all courses taken at North Florida Baptist College to receive the Bachelor of Science degree. A student must take all required courses for his particular course of study.

All students graduating with a Bachelor of Science degree must complete Baptist History I and II, Bible Doctrines I and II, Computer Basics, Emerging Church Theology, English Grammar I and II, Fundamentals of Speech, Old and New Testament Survey, Personal Evangelism, Personal Finance, Philosophy of Music, Science of the Classroom, Spiritual Warfare I and II, and US History I with a grade of "C" or better.

Students must take Personal Evangelism the very first semester that they are enrolled at North Florida Baptist College; however, Personal Evangelism does not fulfill this Bible requirement. All students must achieve a "C" or higher in all Bible courses to receive credit.

BIBLE DEPARTMENT

BI101 Old Testament Survey – This course is a general synopsis of each of the books contained in the Old Testament. Emphasis is given to major characters, events, and themes of each book.

One semester, three hours

BI102 New Testament Survey – This course is a systematic overview of each of the books contained in the New Testament. Emphasis is given to key verses and themes in each book.

One semester, three hours

BI103 Personal Evangelism – This course is a careful study of the Spirit-filled life of the soulwinner with an emphasis on the individual, his message, and the means of evangelism.

One semester, two hours

BI120 Life of Christ – This course is a chronological overview of the 33½ years of Christ's earthly ministry.

One semester, three hours

BI125 Prayer – This course is a study of the importance of prayer for the Christian with an emphasis placed on the Biblical explanation and practical application.

One semester, two hours

BI127 Biblical Separation and Standards – This course is a practical, historical, and Scriptural approach to understanding Bible standards.

One semester, two hours

BI200 Genesis – This course is a thorough study of the first book of the Bible giving special emphasis to creation, the flood, and the early history of the world as taught in God’s Word.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI201 Exodus-Deuteronomy – This course is a systematic study of the books of Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy, including the wilderness wanderings of the Israelites, the tabernacle, and sacrifices.
One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI203 Corinthians – This course is a verse-by-verse study of I and II Corinthians studying God’s instructions to churches with major problems in the areas of doctrine and discipline.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI102

BI205 Bible Principles – This course deals with establishing Biblical principles in the Christian life. The student will learn how to establish Scriptural principles to govern his life.
One semester, three hours

BI208 Bible Geography and Customs – This course focuses on geography and customs of the people of the Bible and uses maps to locate places referred to in the Scriptures to help the Bible come to life.
One semester, two hours

BI210 Bible Doctrines I – This course is a survey study of several of the major doctrines of the Bible, including: Bibliology, Theology, and Christology.
One semester, three hours

BI211 Bible Doctrines II – This course is a survey study of several of the major doctrines of the Bible, including pneumatology, anthropology, and hamartiology.
One semester, three hours

BI213 Bible and Science – This course is a study showing that true science points to and is in harmony with the Bible and a development of the idea that secular humanism requires more faith than literal Bible belief.

One semester, two hours

BI217 Pastoral Epistles – This course is designed to acquaint young men with the various blessings, dangers, and responsibilities of pastoring a church as presented in the only three epistles specifically addressed to the pastor.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI102 (Men only)

BI300 Bible History and Chronology – This course is a study of the Bible placing dates, people, and events in chronological order to give an understanding of Biblical content.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites* – BI101, BI102

BI301 Gospels – This course is a concise study of the four Gospels. It begins with a historical background of the intertestamental period, a brief study of the geography of Palestine, and concludes with an overview of the four-fold picture in the Gospels of our Lord (emphasizing Christ's birth, ministry, death, resurrection, post-resurrection appearances, and ascension) showing the inspired harmony of these books.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – BI102

BI302 Acts – This course studies the purpose, methods, power, and program of the early church.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – BI102

BI303 Romans – This course is a verse-by-verse study of Romans giving thorough explanation of the doctrines of salvation, sanctification, and service.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – BI102

BI304 Paul's Shorter Epistles – This course studies the books from Galatians through Philemon chronologically as they fit into the narrative of Acts.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI102

BI306 Jeremiah and Lamentations – This course is a concise study of the prophet Jeremiah giving his purpose and time and an overview of his predictions, especially emphasizing the foretelling of Christ and concluding with the analysis of the poetry in Lamentations.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI308 Poetry and Wisdom Literature – This course is a survey of the Old Testament books of Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI311 Hebrews – This course is a verse-by-verse study of the book of Hebrews.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI102

BI312 Premillennialism – This course will show that premillennialism is in fact a way of Bible interpretation; principles of hermeneutics will also be introduced.

One semester, two hours

BI313 Historical Books I – This course is a chapter-by-chapter study of Joshua, Judges, and Ruth with a special emphasis on successful Christian living and on leadership principles found in these books.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI314 Historical Books II – This course is a survey of I and II Samuel, I and II Kings, I and II Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah, and Esther. A biographical approach is used in this course with special attention given to the leaders discussed in these books.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI316 Proverbs – This course is a practical study of Solomon's instructions to his son concerning the qualities of a righteous man, a wicked man, and a virtuous woman.
One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI317 The Church – This course studies a New Testament church and compares it to various denominations.
One semester, two hours

BI325 Christ in the Old Testament – This course discusses how the Old Testament prophesied extensively concerning the Person of Christ, what He has done, what He is doing now, and what He will do in the future.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI326 Homiletics I – This course is a study of the preparation and delivery of sermons. The course is designed to instruct in selecting, outlining, and gathering materials, as well as in delivering the message.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisites* – EN112, EN102 (*Men only*)

BI327 Homiletics II – This course is a further study of the preparation and delivery of sermons. Emphasis is given to the preparation of messages for the various facets of the ministry. Practice preaching with careful evaluation is included.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI326

BI356 Spiritual Warfare I – This course deals with a culture at war with the church. It is an in-depth Bible study of how the church is to reach the culture without compromising.
One semester, three hours

BI357 Spiritual Warfare II – This course is a continuation of the in-depth Bible study of a culture at war with the church.
One semester, three hours

BI375 Bible Faith – This course is an extensive study of the faith of the Christian. Bible characters are used to make practical application as well as Bible principles of faith to build the faith of the Christian in his goal of pleasing God.

One semester, three hours

BI401 Isaiah – This course is a practical study of the historical setting of the book emphasizing the personality and purpose of the prophet with an analytical study focusing on Messiah in His sufferings and His glory as well as the prophecy and predicted blessings that would come through Christ to both Jew and Gentile.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI402 Bible Prophecy – This course deals with the revelation of the last days and a chronology of things to come.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisites* – BI101, BI102

BI403 Ezekiel – This course is an analysis of the book, the purpose, personality, and visions of the prophet Ezekiel. Special emphasis is given to God's dealings with Israel in the past and future.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI404 Minor Prophets – This course is a study of the prophets from Daniel through Malachi, including the historical setting, the ministry of each prophet, and an analysis of the message and prophetic content of each book.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI101

BI405 General Epistles – This course is a historical, doctrinal, and practical study of the epistles of James; I and II Peter; I, II, and III John; and Jude.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI102

BI411 Hebrew Study Tools – This course is a study of Biblical Hebrew introducing the alphabet and principles of grammar. Emphasis is upon understanding how to use various research tools for finding precise meanings of Old Testament words and preparing Scripture texts for preaching and teaching.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI309 (*Men only*)

BI427 Apologetics – This course uses the systematic theological approach in preparing the student to defend and explain the facts and proofs of Christianity.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – BI327

BI441 Cults – This course is a study of the historical and theological positions of modern-day perversions of Biblical truths.

One semester, three hours

BI455 Emerging Church Theology – This course is a detailed focus on the Emerging Church movement and how it is influencing Baptist churches. This course defines the post-modern movement by their own terms and reveals the seducing spirits that have defined its doctrine.

One semester, two hours

CHURCH COMMUNICATIONS DEPARTMENT

CC101 Computer Basics – This course is designed to give students the basic understanding of computers for their college career. It begins with an examination of file systems and file management and progresses to training in Microsoft Word and Microsoft Excel.

One semester, three hours

CC130 Digital Photography I – Designed with the beginner photographer in mind, this course will teach students the core terminology and key functions of the DSLR camera, how to move from Auto mode to Manual mode, and how to apply each setting to different situations to give photos a balanced and professional touch.

One semester, one hour

CC131 Digital Photography II – This course will give students an in-depth look at how to frame a picture effectively in different venues and lighting conditions as well as the tools and methods used to take a great picture with a cell phone or a DSLR camera using the correct methods and techniques to take proper portrait and landscape pictures that will help give the church's graphics and web design a first-class look.

One semester, one hour *Prerequisite* – CC130

CC140 Video Production I – This course is designed to give students an understanding of the basic terminology of video production and how to find the right equipment and use the camera correctly. Students will learn to streamline video production with proper planning and preparation by knowing the steps needed to produce a great video and how to draft a solid storyboard and prepare a script correctly.

One semester, one hour

CC141 Video Production II – This course is designed to help students choose locations and deal with various lighting situations. Whether shooting a video inside the church or making a promotional video using the church’s landscape, students will learn the basics of how to use each venue in distinct ways and will take what has been planned on paper and turn it into a quality video by exploring the fundamentals of framing shots with audio, scenery angles, and use of drones. One semester, one hour *Prerequisite* – CC140

CC210 Fundamentals of Design – This course gives students the basic understanding of graphic design concepts. Concepts include unity, composition, balance, proportion, color theory, and photography in design. Students will see real-world examples of these concepts and complete projects of their own to reinforce their understanding. One semester, two hours

CC211 Photoshop I – This course is the entry-level course for Adobe Photoshop. Students will be introduced to Adobe Creative Cloud and the Photoshop user interface. Students will learn about the menus and tools inside Photoshop along with gaining an understanding of layers and image formats. One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – CC210

CC220 Web Design I – In this course, students will learn the importance of web design in the ministry and the basics of HTML and CSS that will help lay the foundation for being able to code and build websites for the church. One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – CC210

CC221 Web Design II – Students will learn to plan a website efficiently and effectively from start to finish before beginning the building process. This course is designed to help map out concise wire frames, to create functional layout designs and patterns, as well as to make sure the flow of the website has a consistent look and feel.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – CC220

CC230 Digital Photography III – This course will teach students basic photo-editing programs from Lightroom to mobile programs that will help speed up the workflow whether at home or on the go as well as more advanced Lightroom techniques, such as working inside Raw, stylizing photos, working with fog and rain, and color grading.

One semester, one hour *Prerequisite* – CC131

CC231 Digital Photography IV – This course will discuss framing pictures for different social media platforms, helping the church's graphics and web team, real-world applications, how to handle certain events and venues, marketing, getting clients, pricing structure, getting paid, and funding projects and ministries through scheduled photography jobs.

One semester, one hour *Prerequisite* – CC230

CC240 Video Production III – This course will teach students the fundamentals of video editing with a foundation in sequencing, audio, and file management that will help create powerful and professional-looking videos as well as more advanced techniques on adding effects, stylizing video, color grading, and exporting for specific platforms. Students also will be taught the different types of videos to create for the church, how to edit them for each platform, and how to create a reliable workflow among the church's media team.

One semester, one hour *Prerequisite* – CC141

CC241 Video Production IV – This course is designed to give the student a framework for setting up livestream for a church. The student will learn what to look for when choosing equipment, how to set it up correctly, and how to manage a team during church services when running live video.

One semester, one hour *Prerequisite* – CC240

CC301 Computer Hardware – This course gives students a thorough understanding of modern computing devices and how they operate. Students are taught about the major systems found in computing devices, including processors, memory, and storage covering both personal computers and mobile devices.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – CC101

CC310 Photoshop II – This course is a more in-depth discussion of topics, such as blending modes, image correction, and masking.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – CC211

CC311 Photoshop III – This final course will have students exploring filters and patterns, creating color channels, working with and creating actions, and exploring 3D tools.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – CC310

CC320 Church Web Design I – This course is designed to walk students through setting up a hosting account, registering a domain, and building the framework for the website. The wire frame and layouts created previously will be used to start building the basis for the students' website.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – CC221

CC321 Church Web Design II – This course is designed to teach students the core pages and features that make a great church website as well as how to formulate project costs to give the financial department an accurate projection of the total amount it will take to build each site. Students will learn

to tell the story of the church through the graphics and media chosen, finish building their websites, and run quality control to test the functionality of the UX and the experience users will have on all devices.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – CC320*

CC330 Illustrator I – This course is designed to give students a thorough understanding of the menus and tools found in Adobe Illustrator. Students will gain a thorough understanding of vector images and their uses.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite – CC211*

CC350 Principles of Sound – Students will learn the basics of how sound is generated, how it travels, and how it is perceived by a listener. This course explores the frequency range of the human voice and of human hearing. Students also will learn common problems found in sound reinforcement environments and how to correct them.

One semester, two hours

CC401 Computer Networking – This course is designed to give the student an understanding of the concepts and processes necessary to design, build, and maintain a small computer network, including network hardware, network wiring, IP addressing, DNS, DHCP, routing, and security.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – CC301*

CC410 InDesign I – This course is an introductory course for students to explore the user interface and to learn about menus and tools. Students will learn to set type and to work with graphics and images.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite – CC211*

CC411 InDesign II – In this course, students will learn to work with styles for both text and objects and will learn to use master pages and master items needed for print layout.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite – CC410*

CC420 Church Web Design III – From email marketing to building a presence on search engines, this course will teach students how to use three major platforms of social media to convey the church’s message effectively as well as the tools and methods that make this process easier and give the church a first-class look online.

One semester, one hour *Prerequisite* – CC321

CC430 Illustrator II – This course will expand upon topics, such as distortions, gradient meshes, envelopes, and blends. Students will gain extensive experience with the pen tool.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – CC330

CC440 Typography – This course is an in-depth look into text, including physical attributes of type, type family classifications, legibility, and layout design aspects.

One semester, one hour *Prerequisite* – CC210

CC441 Outputting and Adobe Acrobat – This course is designed to give the student an understanding of the processes necessary to send a project off to press, including bleeds, registration, CMYK separations, and soft proofing. Students also will learn the tools available to them in Adobe Acrobat for the handling of PDF files.

One semester, one hour *Prerequisite* – CC410, CC330

CC450 Live Sound Systems – This course will follow the signal chain from the microphone to the mixer, amplifiers, and loudspeakers. Students will gain a technical understanding of the equipment and concepts found in modern sound systems.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – CC350

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

CE201 Survey of Church Ministries – This course is a general overview of all the different ministries of the local New Testament church. The primary goal of every ministry is to advance the cause of Christ.

One semester, two hours

CE208 Child Evangelism – This course is designed to acquaint students with methods for children’s ministries. It includes procedures for teaching Bible songs, Bible verses, and Bible stories by using visual aids as well as evaluating materials designed for use with children.

One semester, three hours

CE211 Christian Manhood – This course is designed to refine young men and to make them more complete by adding propriety to America’s future leaders without taking away their fire and zeal.

One semester, two hours

CE228 Methods of Bible Study – This course is designed to help students gain practical experience in their Bible study. A variety of different methods are introduced to assist students in making their own discoveries in the Bible.

One semester, two hours

CE236 The Bus Ministry – In this course, students have the opportunity to study under the bus director of Immanuel Baptist Church by receiving in-service training in addition to classroom instruction.

One semester, two hours

CE303 Starting a New Testament Church – This course is designed to teach the Biblical and practical methods of starting a New Testament church, whether in the United States or on a foreign field. It includes suggestions for assuming the pastorate of an existing church with practical methods that have been tried and proven by others who have successfully started churches.

One semester, two hours

CE205 American Sign Language I – This course exposes students to American Sign Language, including the alphabet, numbers, basic signs, and the verses of the Romans Road. This course is designed for students who have had no previous knowledge of American Sign Language. Outside interaction with deaf members of Immanuel Baptist Church is required.

One semester, three hours

CE206 American Sign Language II – This course covers more extensive vocabulary, basic sentence structure, basic classifiers, and the entire Romans Road. Outside interaction with deaf members of Immanuel Baptist Church is required.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – CE205

CE305 American Sign Language III – This course focuses on narrative skills, expressive skills, and receptive skills. Students will become proficient enough with the Romans Road to witness to a deaf person. Outside interaction with deaf members of Immanuel Baptist Church is required.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – CE206

CE306 ASL Interpreting I – This introductory course will focus on ethics, professional appearance, and continued expressive and receptive skills by giving students opportunities to interpret for real-life situations. Such skills would include interpreting in the church song service. Outside interaction with deaf members of Immanuel Baptist Church is required.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – CE305

CE307 Youth Ministry – This course teaches methods and philosophies of reaching and training teenagers covering such subjects as youth activities, soulwinning, Bible clubs, music groups, and many other aspects.

One semester, two hours

CE310 Christian School Administration – This course is a study of curricula, public relations, basic laws, parent conferences, and student activities for efficient operation of Christian schools.

One semester, two hours

CE311 Spanish I – This course is the beginning study of the Spanish language and is designed to introduce the student to the basic skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing Spanish, including learning the plan of salvation for soulwinning.

One semester, three hours

CE312 Spanish II – This course continues to develop the student's listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills in Spanish. Content includes a review of Spanish sounds and pronunciations, a review of stress, accentuation, punctuation, and spelling. Emphasis is placed upon oral communication through question and answer drills and daily oral recitation.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – CE311

CE402 Assisting the Pastor – This course is a practical class working with the pastor in areas of visitation in the home and at the hospital, conducting services, weddings, and funerals, and administration..

One semester, two hours

CE404 The Pastor and His Staff – This course studies various relationships encountered as a pastor and includes principles used in dealing with church leaders, staff, and fellow pastors.

One semester, two hours

CE405 ASL Interpreting II – This course is an in-depth immersion into interpreting in church settings. Students will improve their skills by practicing interpreting for Sunday school lessons, prayer, announcements, sermons, and other public speaking situations. Students will be required to interpret for a variety of events of the Immanuel Baptist Church and its ministries. Outside interaction with deaf members of Immanuel Baptist Church is required.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – CE306*

CE406 Deaf Ministry – This course focuses on the history of American Sign Language, deaf culture, the deaf community, and the deaf ministry of the local church. Outside interaction with deaf members of Immanuel Baptist Church is required.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – CE405*

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

ED201 General Teaching Methods – This introductory course explains the aims, materials, and general methods employed in teaching in a Christian school. It emphasizes the practical techniques and the effective use of instructional technology and visual aids in the elementary classroom as well as skills needed by the elementary teacher. Observation and peer teaching are important elements of this course.
One semester, three hours

ED202 Materials and Methods – This introductory course is designed as a teaching skills course which involves the student in current educational reading, various methods of instruction, and the operation and use of classroom visuals and technology in the secondary classroom as well as skills needed by the junior high and high school teacher. Observation and peer teaching are important elements of this course.
One semester, three hours

ED203 Curriculum Development – This course is designed to introduce the student to the various curricula available to the Christian school teacher. It will explore the purpose and practical application of curriculum usage with an emphasis on building one's own curriculum for the classroom.
One semester, three hours *Prerequisite – ED201 or ED202*

ED207 Tests and Measurements – This course studies the nature, principles, and use of testing as an appraisal of learning with an emphasis on the development of formal and informal measurement tools for classroom use on the elementary and secondary levels.
One semester, two hours

ED210 Science of the Classroom – This course covers the techniques and methods of good classroom management, classroom control, lesson preparation, lesson presentation, and annual planning.

One semester, two hours

ED213 Philosophy of Education – This course is a study that places Christian education in its proper perspective with an emphasis upon its historical and philosophical developments in addition to the philosophy behind the methods and goals of Christian education.

One semester, two hours

ED303 Elementary Sports and Games – This course is designed to give the student the knowledge and skills necessary to set up a physical education program appropriate for each elementary grade level. Motor skills, hand-eye coordination, and other motor movements will be studied and analyzed for identification purposes. Peer teaching in addition to observation and practical teaching experiences are provided.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites – ED201, ED210*

ED304 Essentials of Physical Education – This course is designed to give the student knowledge in various sports disciplines with an emphasis on the methods and procedures of teaching Physical Education at the junior high and high school level. Peer teaching in addition to observation and practical teaching experiences are provided.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites – ED202, ED210*

ED311 Teaching Reading and Language – This course is a study of several methods for the teaching of reading and phonics in the elementary school as well as spelling, handwriting, and English grammar. Peer teaching in addition to observation and practical teaching experiences in the classroom are provided.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites – ED201, ED210*

ED312 Teaching Elementary Math – This course is a study of selecting and organizing materials as well as the methods for teaching arithmetic in the elementary classroom. Peer teaching in addition to observation and practical teaching experiences in the classroom are provided.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites* – ED201, ED210

ED313 Teaching Elementary History – This course is a study of selecting and organizing materials as well as the methods for teaching history through storytelling techniques with a spiritual application in the elementary classroom. Peer teaching in addition to observation and practical teaching experiences in the classroom are provided.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites* – ED201, ED210

ED314 Teaching Elementary Science – This course is a study of selecting and organizing materials as well as the methods for teaching science in the elementary classroom with an emphasis on demonstration. Peer teaching in addition to observation and practical teaching experiences in the classroom are provided.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites* – ED201, ED210

ED321 Teaching Secondary English – This course is a study of several methods for teaching English grammar and usage, composition, literature, spelling, vocabulary, and poetry. Peer teaching in addition to observation and practical teaching experiences in the classroom are provided.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites* – ED202, ED210

ED322 Teaching Secondary Math – This course is a study of several methods of teaching mathematics in the secondary classroom. Instruction is given in the proper transfer of these mathematical principles in line with the spiritual and physical life. Peer teaching in addition to observation and practical teaching experiences in the classroom are provided.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites* – MA101, ED202, ED210

ED323 Teaching Secondary History – This course is a study of several methods of teaching history and historical concepts in the secondary classroom using spiritual applications with an emphasis on effective storytelling. Peer teaching in addition to observation and practical teaching experiences in the classroom are provided.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites* – ED202, ED210

ED324 Teaching Secondary Science – This course is a study of several methods of teaching science and scientific concepts in the secondary classroom using spiritual application with an emphasis on demonstration. Peer teaching in addition to observation and practical teaching experiences in the classroom are provided.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisites* – ED202, ED210

ED400 Student Teaching – This course is supervised practice teaching in Berean Christian Academy.

One semester, twelve hours (six hours for music majors)

Prerequisite – All Teaching and Methods Courses

ED401 Professional Development – This course is the application of the comprehension of leadership skills, professional responsibility, human relationships, learning theories, and institutional methodology with an emphasis on the relationship between student behavioral success and classroom management. This course must be completed in conjunction with Student Teaching.

One semester, two hours

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

EN100 Basic English – This noncredit, basic English course is required of all new students whose scores on the English placement test indicate that they do not have sufficient background to take EN101.

One semester, three hours

EN101 English Grammar I – This course is a study of English grammar with an emphasis on parts of speech, sentence structure, usage, and punctuation as well as basic writing skills.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – EN100 or English Placement Test

EN102 English Grammar II – This course studies English grammar with an emphasis upon agreement and usage, complex sentence structures, and advanced writing skills.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – EN101

EN112 Fundamentals of Speech – This course is a study of the basic principles of public speaking with special emphasis on formal presentation and platform techniques.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – EN102

EN201 English Composition – This course is a study of the rules of formal writing. Students prepare descriptive paragraphs, persuasive and expository narratives, as well as a variety of other compositions, including a research paper.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – EN102

EN209 Children's Literature – This course is a survey of literature for children at different grade levels with an emphasis on the telling of children's stories.

One semester, three hours

EN211 English Literature I – This course is designed to acquaint the student with the major works of English literature. One semester, three hours

EN212 English Literature II – This course is a continuing study of the major works of English literature. One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – EN211

EN213 Speaking for Special Occasions – This course is a continuing study in the basic principles and techniques of public speaking with an emphasis on speaking and performing during special events and activities. One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – EN112

EN311 American Literature I – This course is a survey of outstanding American Literature from the Colonial period to the Romantic period. One semester, three hours

EN312 American Literature II – This course is a survey of outstanding American Literature from the Age of Realism to the present. One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – EN311

EN313 American Short Story – This course is a survey of major works of American short story writers with an emphasis on theme and development. One semester, two hours

EN320 Teacher's Writing Seminar – This course teaches the mechanics of writing with a review of sentence structure. Assignments include various forms and letters for parent/teacher communications as well as programs for special events. One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – EN201

EN321 Preacher's Writing Seminar – This course teaches the mechanics of writing with a review of punctuation and sentence structure. Assignments include the writing of a brochure, letters, a church bulletin, a Sunday school lesson, and a narrative. This course is for preachers only.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – EN201 (Men only)*

EN411 World Literature – This survey course is designed to acquaint the student with major literary works from around the world.

One semester, three hours

EN451 Advanced Grammar – This course is an in-depth study of grammar and usage and the fundamental skills of writing.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite – EN102*

EN452 Advanced Composition - This is a course with continued practice in writing and revision of papers with special emphasis on unity, coherence, and flow. Assignments include writing narration, description, persuasion, simple forms of creative writing, and a research paper.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite - EN201*

HISTORY DEPARTMENT

HI201 Baptist History I – This course studies the history of the local church, its founding from the days of Christ, and development and growth through the Middle Ages. Special emphasis is placed on the history of Baptists and the Bible.

One semester, three hours

HI202 Baptist History II – This course is a continued history of the local church from the Middle Ages to the present with special emphasis on the Baptist movement in America.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite – HI201*

HI301 United States History I – This course is a chronological study of America from its colonial beginnings through the circumstances that helped to shape the United States of America into a global military power.

One semester, three hours

HI302 United States History II – This course is a continued study of the United States through the modern day.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – HI301

HI305 World History – This course is a study of the history of man from the beginning of written records to the present day, including the cultural developments of principal countries.

One semester, three hours

HI315 The Age of Reformation – This course studies the political and religious developments of sixteenth-century Europe. Considerable attention is given to the works of Martin Luther, John Calvin, the English Reformation, and the Anabaptists.

One semester, three hours

HI403 Recent American History – This course is a study of the political, economic, social, and cultural history of the United States since 1900.

One semester, two hours

HI422 History of Evangelism – This course is a study of revivals and evangelism since the time of the Reformation through various periods in history when God worked in unusual ways.

One semester, two hours

HI424 History of the South – This course is a study of the political, economic, social, and cultural history of the South since the Colonial era.

One semester, three hours

LADIES MINISTRIES DEPARTMENT

LM102 Christian Womanhood – This course is designed to help women develop the character traits needed to be a Christian lady as described in Proverbs 31.

One semester, two hours

LM204 Women of the Bible – This course focuses on a variety of women found within the pages of Scripture whom God chose to use. Much can be learned from these women.

One semester, two hours

LM220 Managing a Ministry Home – This course will aid young ladies to be “keepers at home” as commanded in Titus 2:5 by learning to balance the ministry and the home.

One semester, two hours

LM230 Ministry of Encouragement – This course is designed to help young ladies learn to be an encourager by discovering the secret to enriching the lives of all those with whom she has relationships.

One semester, one hour

LM263 The Wife of a Leader – This course is designed to give the young lady exposure to the many facets of the role of the leader’s wife by exploring topics, such as loyalty, dying to self, priorities, attire, budgeting, handling criticism, and leadership roles.

One semester, two hours

LM264 Preparation for Marriage – This course focuses on the virtues listed in Titus 2. Topics to be discussed include dating, engagement, and preparing to be a good wife.

One semester, two hours

LM302 Leading a Ladies Ministry – This course is designed to train young ladies for future ministry by teaching how to be the right kind of woman and leading other ladies to do the same.

One semester, two hours

LM303 The Secretary in the Ministry – This course is a study in the unique service the secretary can render in the local church covering the complete spectrum of secretarial duties.

One semester, two hours

LM308 Decorating for Special Events – This course is a study of the types of decorations to be used for showers, weddings, anniversaries, banquets, and entertaining special guests.

One semester, two hours

LM350 Job and His Wife - The course is a study of the book of Job teaching the Christian lady not only how to Biblically respond to trials in her own life but also how to minister effectively to those enduring their own storms. Tribulation comes to everyone, and when it does, we always have a choice. Included is a study into managing the human emotions experienced throughout adverse times, choosing friendships based on Bible principles, and overcoming insecurities that inhibit a successful Christian life.

One semester, two hours

MATH DEPARTMENT

MA101 College Math Survey – This course is a study of functions and algebraic expressions, graphs, quadratic equations, exponents and radicals, and inequalities.

One semester, two hours

MA102 College Math II – This course is a continued study of basic functions and algebraic expressions, graphs, quadratic equations, exponents and radicals, and inequalities.
One semester, two hours

MA201 Advanced Math I – This course provides in-depth coverage of trigonometry, logarithms, analytic geometry, upper-level algebraic concepts, and practice of intermediate algebraic concepts and trigonometry.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – MA102

MA202 Advanced Math II – This course includes lessons on functions, matrices, statistics, and use of the graphing calculator as well as precalculus concepts.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – MA201

MA220 Trigonometry – This course is a study of trigonometric functions, identities, graphs, solutions to triangles, exponential and logarithmic functions, and some advanced college algebra.
One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MA101

MA230 College Geometry – This course is an introduction to advanced Euclidean geometry with topics including circles, constructions, loci, polygons, triangles, and congruence.
One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MA101

MA300 Precalculus – This course is a review of algebra, geometry, and trigonometry concepts with a heavy emphasis placed on common and natural logarithms, trigonometric and exponential functions, logarithmic equations, factorials, and binomial theorems and limits.
One semester, three hours *Prerequisites* – MA202, MA220, MA230

MA301 Calculus – This course is a study of functions, limits, derivatives of algebraic functions, and definite and indefinite integrals with their many applications.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MA300

MA302 Analytic Geometry – This course studies the transcendental and hyperbolic functions, methods of integration, and introduction to vectors.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisites* – MA230, MA301

MA403 Abstract Algebra – This course is a study including set theory, groups, rings, fields, ideals, unique factorization domains, and other topics. Ideas are illustrated with real numbers, modular arithmetic, and other representations.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MA202

MISSIONS DEPARTMENT

MI201 Introduction to Missions – This course is an introductory course designed to study the Biblical basis for missions consisting of an in-depth study of the Great Commission, the role of the local church, and an overview of a missionary's call, preparation, and the ministry of deputation.

One semester, two hours

MI204 Biographies of Great Men – This exciting course discusses the lives and ministries of men who were greatly used by God to alter villages, regions, cities, and countries for the cause of Christ.

One semester, two hours

MI208 History of Missions – From Abraham to Paul to William Carey, this course will provide a thorough understanding of the beginning points of world evangelism and missionaries.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – MI201

MI220 World Missions – This course is a philosophical approach to world missions focusing on developing a vision to reach the world.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – MI201

MI322 Missionary Relationships – This course will study the relationship of missionaries to each other, with the mission board, with pastors and supporting churches, and in his own personal life and family life on deputation and on the field as well as provide helpful instruction and highlight the pitfalls that must be avoided regarding the missionary's love and care for his family.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MI201

MI401 Missions Administration I – This course will instruct the missionary in the areas of taxes, exchange rates, financial planning, personal and ministry expenses, and various business matters as well as give limited instruction in areas, such as construction, mechanics, clerical, medical, foreign travel, and education.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MI201

MI402 Missions Administration II – This course prepares the missionary for choosing a mission board, balancing family life on deputation, planning a survey trip, contacting pastors to arrange meetings, presenting the missionary and the field of service to the pastor and people, preaching on deputation, and creating prayer cards and newsletters.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MI401

MI440 Short-term Missions Trip – This course provides a hands-on experience for the student to be in a mission field setting. The student with a missions major will be required to take at least one missions trip during his junior or senior year unless otherwise approved by the Administration.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT

MU101 Fundamentals of Music – This course is a study of the basics of music, including notation, basic forms of rhythm, music terminology, and intervals.

One semester, two hours

MU102 Music Theory I – Beginning with a comprehensive review of the basic materials of theory, this course covers a detailed study of key signatures, rhythm, intervals, complex time signatures, and scales as well as an introduction to chord building, transposing, and harmony analysis.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite – MU101*

MU120 Piano Techniques I – This course is a group piano class for music students with little or no keyboard experience, which teaches fundamentals of music, major scales, arpeggios, key signatures, and proper playing techniques.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – MU101*

MU121 Piano Techniques II – In this course, students will continue their study of scales and chords, finger exercises, note reading, and basic theory.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – MU120*

MU197 Private Piano Lessons – This course is private instruction based on the skill level of the individual from the intermediate to the advanced pianist.

Eight semesters, one hour each (*Music majors only*)

MU198 Private Instrumental Lessons – This course is private instruction based on the skill level of the individual from the beginner to the advanced instrumentalist.
Eight semesters, one hour each (*Music majors only*)

MU199 Music Internship – This course is a directed study with the purpose of giving the music major practical training in the music ministries of the local church. The student, under the direction of the music director, will learn techniques and styles of a choir, ensemble, orchestra, or other related ministries.
Eight semesters, one hour each (*Music majors only*)

MU201 Music Theory II – This course is a practical application of transposition, and an extensive chord study, including inversions, rhythmic dictation, and two-part harmony with major chords.
One Semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MU102

MU202 Music Theory III – This course includes further chord study, rules of harmonizing, transposing for instruments, four-part writing, and arranging for voices, brass, woodwind, strings, and piano.
One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MU201

MU220 Piano Techniques III – This course will continue the student's study of scales and chords and will help to develop finger dexterity and the ability to continue note reading at a more intermediate level.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – MU121

MU221 Piano Techniques IV – In this course, students will continue previous studies as well as be introduced to hymn playing in basic key signatures.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – MU220

MU230 Music Ministry Administration – This course will discuss the philosophy, organizational techniques, resources, and repertoire of the effective music ministry of the local church. Students will also learn basic conducting patterns to use for song leading. Qualifications, responsibilities, staff relationships, service planning, scheduling, and music library and copyright laws will be discussed as well.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – MU102 (Music majors only)*

MU235 Instrumental Techniques – This course is taught in a group setting for music majors with little or no experience with instruments covering basic techniques and methods of breathing, fingering, embouchure placement, and care. Music majors will also learn how to write music for each instrument, including key and clef specifics.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – MU101*

MU301 Music Theory IV – This course is a continuing study, including form, cadences, non-harmonic tones, modulation, advanced chord study, key relationships, and arranging and writing for an orchestra or the piano depending on the chosen proficiency.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite – MU202*

MU310 Philosophy of Music – This course offers an in-depth study of the Biblical philosophy of music, including the role of music in the local church service and measuring current musical trends and their roots in light of God's Word.

One semester, two hours

MU320 Hymnology – This course is a study in understanding and appreciating our heritage of hymns and Gospel songs with the purpose of preserving this heritage of congregational singing for the generations to come.

One semester, two hours

MU340 Instrumental Methods I – This course is a study of the basic fingering, tonguing, care, and pedagogy of the flute, single-reed woodwinds, and double-reed instruments, including a brief overview of the basic techniques of playing all the concert percussion instruments.

One semester, two hours

MU341 Instrumental Methods II – This course is a study of the basic fingering, tonguing, care, and pedagogy of the trumpet, French horn, trombone, baritone, and tuba as well as a brief overview of the basic fingering, bowing, care, and pedagogy of the violin, viola, cello, and string bass.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – MU340

MU365 Hymn Arrangement and Accompaniment – This course teaches how to arrange a hymn effectively for offertories, invitation, or other special events. Students will learn how to begin and end a hymn creatively and effectively, to transpose a hymn from one key to another, to use different techniques, such as chord substitution, rubato piano playing, and chord inversions. Students will also learn the basic techniques and principles of accompaniment for choirs, solos, congregational singing, and various ensembles.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – Five semesters of MU197

MU370 Music Technologies – This course is designed to help students become familiar with composing and arranging software. Students will be required to produce their own compositions and arrangements using software programs.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MU301

MU430 Conducting – This course covers fundamental beat patterns, basic conducting techniques, including phrasing and articulation, and hand independence. Students will be taught choral and score study and will be able to conduct these areas effectively.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – MU101

MU440 Piano Pedagogy – This course explores the methods, materials, and objectives of effective piano instruction in a private or classroom setting at the beginning, intermediate, and advanced levels. This course also includes planning a recital, motivating the piano student, and keeping the communication open with parents of young students. Students also will be required to show practical application of the skills that they have learned.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite* – Six semesters of MU197

MU360 Teaching Music in the Christian School – This course is a systematic approach to teaching music in the Christian school in which students will learn activities, music notation, and singing skills that should be taught at each grade level from kindergarten through high school. Students also will be taught how to organize, plan, and conduct school programs, teen choir, and ensembles.

One semester, two hours

MU470 Senior Recital – All music majors must present a senior recital in their proficiency.

One semester, one hour *Prerequisite* – *Permission of instructor*

MU475 Music Practicum – Music students will work alongside the Chair of the Music Department and assist in event planning, chapel music, church music, and other areas of practical learning.

One semester, three hours (*Music majors only*)

OFFICE ADMINISTRATION DEPARTMENT

OA101 Personal Finance – This course is a study of economic and personal goals, including personal budgeting, credit buying, borrowing money, banking facilities, the nature of investments, life insurance, casualty insurance, medical insurance, home ownership, stocks and bonds, and retirement plans.

One semester, two hours

OA201 Keyboarding I – This course is designed to teach proper keyboarding techniques and places an emphasis on rhythm and speed.

One semester, five hours

OA202 Keyboarding II – This course is a continued study of keyboarding techniques with added focus on rhythm, speed, accuracy, and editing.

One semester, five hours *Prerequisite* – OA201 or *Keyboarding Placement Test*

OA205 Desktop Publishing – This course uses multimedia technology, such as Microsoft Word and PowerPoint and teaches how to use them most effectively. Computer graphics will be highlighted in generating visual aids, such as charts, posters, slides, etc., as well as the development of newsletters, brochures, flyers, etc.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – CC101

OA212 Office Procedures – This course is designed to help students develop proper office communication, efficient filing and record management, and appropriate behavior in the workplace. Students will learn not only the skills of effective and professional communication in written, oral, and verbal messages but also to develop the best systems for file

management and storage in regard to creating and filing paper files, computer files, and digital documents.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – CC101*

OA222 Proofreading and Editing – This course is designed to give practical tips and experience in proofreading and editing various documents.

One semester, two hours

OA301 Transcription I – This course is an intensive development of the principles of speed and accuracy in transcribing dictation.

One semester, five hours *Prerequisites – EN102, OA202*

OA302 Transcription II – This course is a continuing development of the principles of transcription skills, including spelling, punctuation, and English grammar to produce error-free documents.

One semester, five hours *Prerequisite – OA301*

OA303 Database Applications – This course will familiarize students with the roles and advantages of databases, including programming and adding calculations within the database.

One semester, two hours

OA310 Basic Accounting – This course is a practical application of basic accounting principles, including data accumulation systems, income measurement, valuation of assets and liabilities, and the study of financial statements and incorporates software for preparing financial statements and annual reports. Other topics will include receivables and payables, payroll, internal control procedures, and the use of data processing.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – OA101*

OA315 Financial Independence – This course is designed to help the student start the journey toward financial

independence. This course will not only inform but also equip the student with tools to plan and schedule his finances to achieve freedom from debt. This class teaches how to avoid common financial mistakes, how to dig out of financial mistakes made, and how to fulfill the command to be a good steward.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite - OA101*

OA404 Practical Layout Applications – This course builds on the techniques learned in Photoshop I and InDesign I by incorporating them into church publications, such as bulletins, invitation cards, tracts, and flyers.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisites – CC211, CC315*

OA410 Church Administration – This course is an analysis of the leadership, organization, and function of the local church and Sunday school, including communication, accountability, training of teachers, evaluation and selection of curricula, and promotion. In addition, this course studies the methods and means used in running the financial affairs of the church and deals with the financial aspects of the pastorate, including budgets, financial management, business meetings, loans, insurance, incorporation, personnel policies, social security, and taxes. Prime emphasis is given to the preparation of budgets and the control of expenditures in order to balance them with the operational budget.

One semester, three hours

OA412 Secretary Internship – In this course, students will be assigned to work in a ministry office. Evaluation will be based on efficiency, dependability, punctuality, accuracy, and attitude.

One semester, eight hours *Prerequisite - All required Office Administration courses*

PSYCHOLOGY DEPARTMENT

PS110 Christian Conduct – This course is designed to introduce the student to propriety and protocol for the ministry and for life.

One semester, two hours

PS112 Christian Leadership Principles – This course takes the student through the basics of followship with a distinct Christian perspective. Emphasis is placed on having a Scriptural attitude in life and building from this a successful foundation for Christian service.

One semester, two hours

PS201 Christian Psychology – This course studies how to understand one's self and others.

One semester, two hours

PS205 Child Psychology – This course is designed for teachers and leaders of children and youth. It gives consideration to the psychological factors in the maturing and growth of the child. It tends to help the student to search out the basis for children's actions and enables the leader to better understand the child physically, morally, socially, emotionally, mentally, and spiritually.

One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – PS201*

PS207 Christian Marriage and Family – This course is designed as preparation for marriage giving students some instruction in finding a mate and in the interaction which takes place in marriage and family life.

One semester, two hours

PS212 Educational Psychology – This course uses psychology in the classroom through case studies and situations.
One semester, three hours *Prerequisite – PS201*

PS409 Principles of Counseling – This course is designed to give students a solid foundation to provide Biblical counseling in a church setting. Students will be examining typical situations faced in the church ministry along with Scriptural solutions.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – PS201*

PS421 Biblical Counseling – This course presents Scriptural principles and practices for helping those who physically, mentally, psychologically, and especially spiritually need counsel in addition to detailed studies in counseling youth, engaged couples, and those with marital problems.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – PS201*

PS422 Essentials of Student Counseling – This course gives instruction concerning guidance and counseling in the Christian school.
One semester, two hours *Prerequisite – PS201*

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

SC101 Biology – This course is a study of the fundamental principles and characteristics of living organisms; classification, similarities, and differences between plants and animals; and reproduction and development of seeds, plants, and animals. An introduction to the principles of heredity and the Biblical answer to the problems of organic evolution are discussed.
One semester, three hours

SC201 Physical Science – This course is a survey including such topics as the history and objectives of natural science, origins of modern science in the Renaissance, introduction to Newtonian mechanics, electric and magnetic phenomena, atomic and molecular theory, chemical terminology, geology and the structure of the earth, as well as astronomy of the solar system and the universe.

One semester, three hours

SC203 Basic Physics I – This course presents the foundations of classical physics with applications to motion, forces, and energy.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MA101

SC204 Basic Physics II – This course is a continuing study that includes wave motion, optics, and sound.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – SC203

SC302 General Chemistry – This course is an introduction to atomic and molecular structure, the periodic classification of elements, chemical terminology, bonding and compounds, properties of matter in various states, chemical reactions and stoichiometry, solutions, electrochemistry, oxidation-reduction, organic chemistry, and acid-base equilibrium and titration.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – MA101

SC410 Anatomy and Physiology I – This course is designed to be an in-depth study of the body and how it works.

One semester, three hours

SC411 Anatomy and Physiology II – This course is a continuing study of the body systems in a more intense setting.

One semester, three hours *Prerequisite* – SC410
