Josias Pennington (1854-1929), junior partner in the celebrated architectural firm of Baldwin & Pennington, designed this four-story house for himself and oversaw its construction ca. 1900 on what until then had been vacant land on one of Baltimore's most fashionable blocks. Pennington and his family lived in the house until his death.

The Penningtons sold the house to a branch of the Abell family, long the owners of the Baltimore Sun; Mrs. Anna T. [Schley] Abell [(1870-1948)], the widow of Arunah S. Abell II, lived there with some

of her children from 1930 until her death, and was succeeded as principal tenant by her son George W. Abell [(-)], whol ived there until ca. 1961. After renting it out as a single-family home for some time, the Abell heirs turned it into apartments in the late 1960s, and it remains an apartment building today [2001].
