Ca. 1885 what had been the side yard of a house at neighboring #714 Madison Avenue was built over, and in 1886 the city directory listed Mary Calwell [(1530 -)] as a milliner at #710, where she remained until 1910, and where other hands carried on the "Calwell Millinery Shop" until 1932. After that #710 was a laundry, a furniture

store and a dental laboratory before being demolished, along with the rest of its block, for a street realignment in the mid-1970s.

The building's big claim to notice.lay in its having served, from 1892 to 1897, as the first home of the University School, a preparatory academy founded by William Staples Marston [(1854-1926)], Harvard, '76 which gained considerable local applause as
