Introduction

"We wanted to be seen as effective (doing the right things) and efficient (doing things right)."

-David Love on the World Wildlife Fund Welcome Pack

This quote above describes the purpose of every communication that World Wildlife Fund sent to its monthly donors.

Please consider this quote. Can you make your every email, every note, and every phonecall emphasize that your charity is doing what is effective to solve the problem, or being more efficient thanks to your donor's monthly gift? Why not flatter and excite your donor as you share these two ideas?

In this week, we're going to be covering how to make your donor feel welcomed into your family as a monthly giver. They deserve special treatment!

How can you make your donor feel special, without breaking the bank, and without driving yourself crazy with too many cultivation activities?

We'll be talking about cost-effective welcome packs. Automatic emails to your donors. And building a once or twice yearly friendraiser activity into your monthly donor plan.

Let's get started!

How to write a series of welcome emails

When you start emailing your monthly donors, what do they really want?

You need to target new donors during the 'honeymoon phase' when they've first made a gift to your organization using a series of welcome emails built around telling your new donor how their gift is making a difference.

Email 1: You are Helping Not just X but Y!

was "Did You Know?"

Does your mission help more than one kind of person? Make your new monthly donor feel good by telling them how their gift is making a difference in unexpected ways. If one part of your mission is more prominent than another, then how about telling them how they are helping another group of people?

What would you do with HOPE?

We're hoping you would consider giving hope through our <u>Giver of Hope</u> monthly donor program. Your donation, large or small, keeps low-income children from becoming a statistic.

Email 2: Your Nonprofit's Efficiency thanks to your donor

You should ALWAYS include how monthly giving helps you be more efficient with your nonprofit dollars.

Make sure you thank your donors for helping you be more efficient, sending fewer unwanted communications including telephone calls, direct mail, reminders, and more.

Show the donors a chart that explains, "If even half of our donors gave monthly, like YOU, <donor name> then our nonprofit would save \$20,000 per year!

Thank you so much for helping our nonprofit save your donation for what matters most, helping (insert your mission here)

Email 3: The Survey Email

When you create a survey in surveymonkey, try to keep the number of questions down to one page. Use multiple choice answers instead of text fields. People are lazy, and if they can just click a button and get out of there, that helps them finish your survey.

This survey should make clear that you will only talk with your monthly donor when they want you to. So in order to be respectful of your monthly donor's needs and boundaries, just like in a good relationship, you need to get clear on their communication preferences.

Email 5: The Event Email

If you can give them a link to RSVP to one or all of these events, that's even better, to help you plan out your guest list, food, seating (if applicable) and more.

Remember the words of David Love on the World Wildlife Fund's welcome kit for new donors, "We wanted to be seen as effective (doing the right things) and efficient (doing things right)". Can you look at your communications with your monthly donors now, and say that each communication enforces either one or the other of these ideas about your nonprofit?

How to create a cost-effective welcome kit

Your welcome kit sets the tone for your donors to interact with your nonprofit. It is the direct mail equivalent of a handshake and a hug, and you want to make it seem as bright, upbeat, and exciting as possible.

Of course, we don't have unlimited money to spend on these things, so how can you keep the costs down, while simultaneously making your donor feel special?

How can you use your welcome kit not just to welcome your donor, but to remind them to feel good about giving to your cause?

When you think about what to offer your monthly donors, think about what people look at all day.

Their fridge? What about a magnet? Don't think that your nonprofit has to be related to food to use a magnet. Lots of people use magnets. The ASPCA (an animal nonprofit) for example sends out magnets of cute puppies and kittens, and it's hard to forget them when you look at your fridge all the time!

Their desk? What about a pen? A mousepad? (The Cat Adoption Team uses a Cafepress store to manufacture mousepads and other items for their donors.)

Their mailbox? What about a note that they can send? (Amnesty International has a lovely package that includes a note donors can send to give hope to those that they serve.)

Their car? What about a bumper sticker? (How about some free advertising for your nonprofit?)

Their clothes? What about a T-shirt? (You may wish to save this for your largest donors, but this can again be free advertising for your nonprofit.)

What should go into your cost effective welcome kit for monthly donors?

Engaging monthly givers after the honeymoon period

Some charities like to make a commitment to their donors plain when they sign up for monthly giving.

For example, the Wellington Zoo says,

"Our guarantee to you:

As a regular supporter, we'll keep you updated with information on how your donations are making a difference.

- Regular newsletter 'Zoo Views'
- Copy of our annual report highlights
- Regular email updates, including news from our keepers, veterinary team, and other Zoo staff
- Invitations to special events at the Zoo, including an annual 'behind the scenes' invitation to see how your donation is helping the Zoo"

What is the sequence to help people keep excited and engaged with your nonprofit after the honeymoon period?

Keep calling, keep emailing, keep communicating with these donors.

If you only have a few of them, why not segment out the highest dollar value givers and give them a phonecall once every quarter just to check in and tell them how things are going?

Maybe even have a conference call with your monthly donors, so they can chat with program staff and ask them how programs are going on the ground?

Honor them once a year with a special friendraiser just for them.

Remember their birthdays and send them a birthday card.

If they have a work or wedding anniversary, remember this and send them an anniversary card.

Do you have any other ideas for engaging your monthly donors long term?

If not, why not give a monthly gift to several more successful nonprofits in town to see how they thank you, and what they do to make you feel special?

Creating branded communications for monthly givers

What is the main reason people are giving monthly? So you can do MORE good works.

Your branded communications can emphasize this.

Here are some examples of branding for monthly givers from around the world.



The Wellington Zoo in New Zealand makes a beautiful statement with their monthly giving logo. It looks like a professionally designed logo, but it emphasizes the MONTHLY aspect of giving. As in, the donor is giving of their heart every month. There's even a little heart on the calendar! Beautiful. IF you're looking for inspiration for your monthly donor branding, you could do worse than the literalism of the Wellington Zoo's logo.



Through Sustainers Harvest, our monthly giving program, a donation will automatically be charged to your credit card each month. You choose the amount you wish to donate and you may withdraw from the program at any time.

Please be sure to select the Recurring Gift option below.

Here's an example of a monthly giving logo for the Rhode Island Food Bank's monthly giving program.

It explains at the top of the page the usual concerns of monthly givers, and it looks polished and professional. That's the sort of image you would want for your monthly giving program as well. I am sure this logo goes out on all of their monthly donor communications, and they may have some letterhead with this logo as well.



I love this branding from the New York Public Library. I love the logo, and the tagline. What is their monthly giving tagline? Keep Libraries Strong! It's to the point! And it's a I inch button as well, and they highlight this on their website, so you know you can show your support visibly when you become a monthly donor to the library.



I really like this one from FoodForThePoor.org because it puts into context different ways to give monthly, and it ties it to people's faith. Faith-based donors are some of the most loyal and generous donors you can find, and if that fits with your mission, take the Angels of the Poor example and see if you can apply it to your nonprofit. 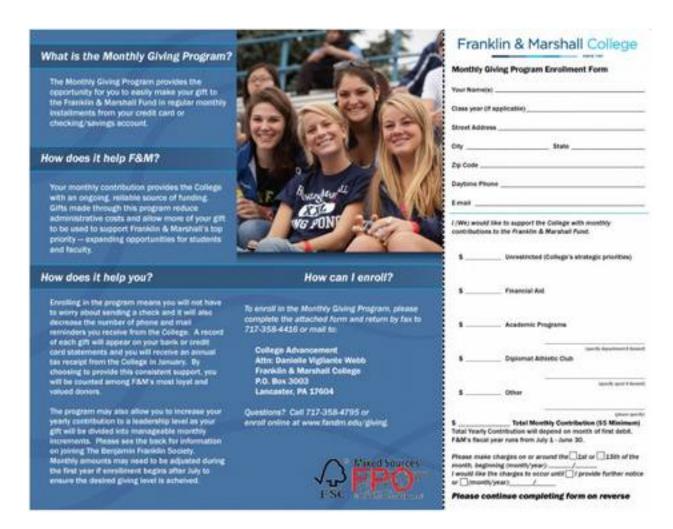
Here's an example of a monthly giving program called Hearts for the City from Union Gospel Mission in Vancouver BC.

I love how the blue of the logo is echoed in the background of the picture. Again, the logo looks professionally designed. They have a name and logo for their program, but they don't have a tagline, which would make this stronger. A picture of a monthly donor and why they give would be stronger here as well.
